Kitimat is a coastal community of about 9,000 people located in the captivating beauty of Northwest BC's stunning and rugged landscape. Our community sits at the head of the Douglas Channel next to the Kitimat River and is surrounded by mountains.

Kitimat is abound with natural opportunities. Beyond being situated in a spectacular natural setting which provides ample opportunity for recreation and enjoyment, we have a growing local economy that provides abundant employment and business opportunities. Since its inception, Kitimat has been a key pillar of the regional and provincial economy. Our robust industrial sector translates to high paying employment and business opportunities. Our planned community provides comfortable, relaxed living with everything you and your family need from preschool to retirement, including a variety of housing options. Abundant green spaces, an extensive walkway system and carefully balanced residential, commercial and industrial areas add to Kitimat's livability.

We have modern health care facilities and the average commute to work takes only minutes. Indoor and outdoor recreation facilities and surrounding wilderness provide plenty of opportunity for an active, outdoor, coastal lifestyle.

History & Culture

Kitimat is derived from Git-a-maat (Kitamaat), a Tsimshian description of the Haisla, which means "People of the Snow." Prior to colonization, the Kitamaat band inhabited the traditional territory that Kitimat is now situated on.

HAISLA NATION

The Haisla, meaning "dwellers downriver," have a rich culture and history and have occupied lands in Northwest BC for over 9,000 years. Today about half of their 1,700 members live in Kitamaat Village (about 10 km from Kitimat). The modern day Haisla Nation is an amalgamation of two historic bands: the Kitamaat of the Douglas and Devastation channels and the Kitlope of the upper Princess Royal Channel and Gardner Canal.

Living and working on the land and water has always been fundamental to the Haisla way of life. They have lived off the land and water resources on their traditional territory for thousands of years, and are committed to the preservation of those resources for future generations.

The Haisla Nation Council has shown support for respectful, equitable, and sustainable development on their traditional territory. They have welcomed the LNG industry onto their territory by supporting LNG Canada, the

proposed Kitimat LNG project, and through the development of their own proposed Cedar LNG project. Throughout the process of LNG speculation and development, the Haisla have remained committed to protecting the environment, preserving the area's natural assets, and expanding opportunities for their members.



DISTRICT OF KITIMAT

Kitimat was built in the 1950s on the traditional territory of the Haisla to support construction and operation of the new world-class Alcan aluminum smelter. Our community was designed by renowned city planner Clarence Stein to facilitate an environment that would attract and retain workers. Our history is steeped in multiculturalism as the developing community attracted workers from around the world. Kitimat remains a welcoming and diverse place to reside as natural opportunities continue to inspire workers and families from across the globe to make Kitimat their home.

Over the years, other industries including forestry, pulp and paper, and methanol production have made Kitimat their home. In October 2018, the energy sector arrived when the decision was made by LNG Canada to develop a \$40B LNG export facility in Kitimat.

The LNG Canada project is the single largest private sector investment in Canadian history. The investment is a case of history repeating itself, as Alcan's investment in the Kitimat aluminum smelter was the single largest private investment in Canada's history at the time.



Kitimat's Industrial Expansion

Kitimat has twice been the site of Canada's largest ever private investment

Our community was created to serve industry, and industrial development continues to be a driving force behind Kitimat's growth. Our industrial activity delivers plenty of high-paying and rewarding employment opportunities as well as a robust tax base for community amenities. There are several proposed industrial developments for Kitimat. These projects and developments present a positive outlook for our economy for decades to come. Some of the most recent and notable industrial developments include:

Active & Proposed Industrial Projects

Rio Tinto Modernization (2011 - 2015) COMPLETE

The Kitimat Modernization Project increased the Rio Tinto aluminium smelter's production capacity using the most cost effective, energy efficient and environmentally friendly technology available. The modernized smelter restarted operations in mid-2015.



Rio Tinto BC Works Kemano T2 Project (2017 - 2022) ACTIVE

The BC Works smelter in Kitimat is powered by the hydroelectric Kemano Powerhouse which receives water from the Nechako Reservoir via a single tunnel that is now over 60 years old. Completion of a second tunnel will ensure the long-term reliability of the power supply from the Kemano Powerhouse.

LNG Canada Phase One & Coastal GasLink

The LNG Canada project is the single largest private investment in Canadian history. It includes building and operating an LNG liquefaction, storage, and loading terminal in Kitimat to export liquefied natural gas (LNG) from the Montney basin. The gas will be transported from the Montney basin to Kitimat through the 670 km Coastal GasLink pipeline.


